Church Conference 2023 Presentation

Here at Camp Chapel, we are called to worship, make disciples, and serve. As we emerge from the challenges of the pandemic, we are finding our new normal. Our new normal is a mix of restarting or reinvigorating existing ministries and planning to extend our reach beyond the church doors.

Since our last gathering, Camp Chapel has been active. In March, we began a new ministry called "JOY" - short for Just Older Youth. The purpose of these mid-day monthly gatherings is to bring together seasoned adults for fellowship. Attenders bring a bag lunch and drink, the ministry leaders provide desserts and coffee, and play games – especially dominoes. Some of our members provide transportation for homebound persons and others bring along friends.

In May, we rejoiced at the confirmation of six youth – including the baptism and confirmation of one. This was the first confirmation class in more than 5 years. A previously confirmed youth served as a youth mentor for the class. Our newest members serve the community as acolytes, liturgists, and volunteers for VBS and outreach ministries including the Easter Egg Hunt, Children's Carnival, or yard sale.

A first-time Volunteer Appreciation Day was well-received. The staff showed its appreciation for everything our volunteers do – from serving as ministry team leaders to teaching classes to planting and weeding the gardens and everything in between. In fact, it was so well received that we think it will be an annual event.

Speaking of gardens, another ministry outreach was the Community Garden. Our members took four garden plots that were unused, invited others to join in, and planted vegetables with the purpose of supplementing our partnership with the Perry Hall Community Food Pantry. The weather and deer proved challenging, but our volunteers persevered.

Vacation Bible School returned to Camp Chapel this year – but with a twist and an addition. Based upon the availability of our leaders, VBS took place in the evening, and we added an adult class to make this a family event. We had fewer children in the evening, but those who attended learned and grew from the experience.

Who would think that a Yard Sale would be a time of hands-on ministry? Camp Chapel does! At our latest yard sale, our white elephant table organizer was able to pray with a vendor who arrived very upset. When other vendors saw what was going on, they also gathered around her for support. You never know who the church might touch by simply opening our grounds.

Our on-going ministries continue to impact our church family and the community. Christian education for all ages is making a difference in the lives of our children, youth, and adults as they stretch and grow in knowledge and spirit. Worship is enhanced by the excellence of our music director and the vocal and bell choirs. Our leadership teams (including Church Council, Finance, Trustees, and age level ministries among others) provide the inspiration, resources, and space for connections among the church and community to thrive.

The Fellowship Hall is once again being used to its fullest. In addition to being the place for adult bible study, children's Sunday School music, and committee meeting space, we also open our doors to self-help and community groups (including the Scouts). Our new kitchen manager worked diligently to renew our license and the kitchen team is once again serving fund-raising dinners.

The Pillow Project sews hundreds of pillows for heart patients and new mothers and the Crochet Ministry creates hats for newborns at Franklin Square Hospital. The 'thank you' notes we receive are evidence that we are touching lives. The Crochet Ministry has also begun providing Prayer Blankets for our babies at their baptism. The film seminar series continues to meet monthly by ZOOM for a presentation and lively discussion. The participants are from the church and beyond.

There is not enough space to list everything that we do, but you can see for yourself that Camp Chapel is fulfilling its call to worship, make disciples, and serve.

Good morning, Barbara!



What Is a QR Code?

Did you notice that blob in the middle of the promotion for the film seminar? It's a QR Code. QR stands for Quick Response. On a smart phone, one can scan the code with the phone's camera or a QR Code reader app and access a web page without having to type the address. If you have an event that you wish to publicize in the *Acorn*, feel free to include a QR Code in your advertisement or event flyer if you feel that it would be appropriate. They can be particularly useful for events that: a) are open to the public, and b) require a registration form. Please be aware that the church office will **NOT** create or provide QR Codes for you.

A QR Code is nothing more than a weird looking picture. To create a QR Code:

- 1. The event must be included in the event calendar on the CCUMC web site.
- 2. Use your favorite browser to access the page for the event on the web site.
- 3. Right-click anywhere on the page and a pop-up menu will appear.
- 4. Click "Create QR Code for this page" in the menu.
- 5. When the QR Code image appears, click the "Download" button to save your QR Code in your Downloads folder (some browsers allow you to specify other locations or change the name of the QR Code file before saving it).
- 6. Insert the QR Code in your ad or flyer as you would any picture.

GIFT CARDS

Once again, we are selling gift cards for the holidays. For gift cards that you order, you pay the face value of the card and Camp Chapel will receive a percentage of that cost.

Order forms and the retailer list will be emailed. Individuals without email will receive order forms by mail. Printed copies are available at each church entrance.

Completed order forms can be emailed to <u>office@campchapel.org</u>, dropped off at the church office or with your check if you are mailing.

You may pay by cash, check or Bill Pay. Make checks payable to Camp Chapel with "Gift Cards" in the memo section. Bill Pay transactions also need to reflect "Gift Cards" in the comments section.

If you mail in your order form with payment, please be sure to address it to Camp Chapel, PO Box 15, White Marsh, MD 21162.

Credit card payments will not be accepted.

Order forms must be received by 12 noon on Sunday, December 3.

Gift cards will be available for pick up at church on Sunday, December 10 from 8 am-12:30 pm.

Old Jesus

When I was too young to know better, I remember daydreaming in catechism class at Saint Michael Catholic School as some nun nattered on about how Jesus, the Son of God, died on the cross for our sins. Of course, I'd heard it all before, so my mind tended to wander. At least once or twice I remember fantasizing about building a time machine. With it, I could travel back to Jerusalem. I'd take along some modern weaponry, like maybe a tommy gun or a flame thrower and a bunch of hand grenades. I didn't know enough about ordnance and armament to think any more high-tech than that, and, after all, it was the 1950s and my only sources of knowledge on the subject of guns and ammo were comic books like All American Men of War, Battle Ground, Our Fighting Forces, Our Army at War, and of course, G.I. Joe. When I arrived, I'd stride up to the top of Golgotha and start spraying those rotten Roman soldiers with hot lead. I'd blow them to smithereens! Then, while the survivors were fleeing in fear from all the carnage I had caused, and before they could send for reinforcements (I wasn't worried about reinforcements – I had plenty of rounds and lots more grenades), I'd take my Lord and Savior down from the cross, bind up his wounds, take him to a place of refuge, and humbly receive his eternal gratitude. Most times that was about as far as I got. At that point, I could feel the presence of Sister standing sternly next to my desk with a ruler poised to strike. The class would be giggling because she had called on me, and in my head, I was too busy shooting up Calvary two millennia in the past to have heard her.

But regarding dreaming of saving Jesus from the cross... Talk about completely missing the point! The sacrifice of the cross is why Jesus assumed a human life and came to dwell among us. I'm a grown-up Christian. I get that now.

But recently I recalled those childish imaginations, and it got me to wondering. What if Jesus had <u>not</u> been crucified so young?

What if Jesus had somehow avoided being executed and had lived to become an old man? What if the high priest, instead of sending Jesus back to Pilate, had said, "Wait, wait, wait. Hang on a minute. This Jesus person does make some interesting points, and the people seem to love him. Why don't we just leave him be and see how this thing plays out? I mean, we don't really *need* to put him to death right now, do we? Crucifixion won't be going out of style anytime soon, and Pilate will still be here next week or next

year even. No, let's just wait and see where he goes with this. Give him a little more rope. It might be amusing." So, they recommend that he be released. They take back the thirty pieces of silver they paid Judas, and they allow Jesus to continue with his earthly ministry and he continues saying and doing wondrous things.

Many years later, Jesus is sitting in a rocker on a porch surrounded by his grandchildren. Jesus says, "Did I ever tell you about the time I raised..."

"Your friend Lazarus from the dead!" the oldest one, a teenager with an attitude, interrupts, rolling his eyes. "Only about a zillion times Pop-Pop!"

"Well how about the time I turned..."

"Yeah, yeah, water into wine at the wedding. We've heard it all before!"

Peter is sitting there, and he's a geezer too, of course, and he's grumpy today. "You're the miracle worker, how about you make it so I don't have to get up three times every doggone night to pee! I haven't had a decent eight hours sleep since we retired here to Capernaum! You make lepers clean, so how 'bout smoothing these wrinkles? You make the lame walk, but when are you ever gonna get around to curing my sciatica?"

Of course, for Jesus's purpose in becoming human, not to mention all those prophesies that would need to be fulfilled, eventually he would still have to die for our sins, but it wouldn't have quite the same impact, would it?

"They crucified Jesus? Oh man! What was he, 93? 94?" (A short reflective pause.) "Well, he had a good run. What's for supper?"

But no, Jesus didn't grow old, he died young. He was probably 33 years old, a man at the height of his physical powers, charismatic, forceful, strong, and beautiful. Here's the thing: we all know he suffered and was executed, but those are just words. Okay, he stopped breathing and his heart ceased to beat, but that's only the clinical part of his death. Dying on the cross was only part of what he sacrificed for us and for our sins. The full sacrifice of Jesus was not just giving away his human life, it was giving away his human life! We all know how he suffered. The scourging, the taunting, the beating, having to carry that cross up to the place of his execution, the nails, more taunting, the agony, the thirst, the tearful farewell to his mother, the feeling of having been forsaken by his God, his father, and finally the giving up of his spirit. That's the story of how he gave up his life. We talk about that all the time. But what we don't talk about is the fact

that in addition to being killed, he also gave away his *life*! He didn't just die, he lost forty plus years of existence on this planet. He abandoned forty years of philosophy and theology. Forty years of parables, of miracles, of wisdom, of accomplishments. It was family and children. It was play. It was work. It was memories. It was friendships. It was dreams. It was loving and it was loss. It was sorrow and it was joy. It was pleasure and it was pain. It may even have been a rocking chair surrounded by grandchildren. It was all this and more — his whole *life* that he gave up!

There's a great scene in the movie *Unforgiven* in which Clint Eastwood's character talks of killing a man. He describes it as stealing from him all that he is and all that he ever will be. Killing a person not only puts an end to them, but also robs them, along with the rest of the world, of their future. Everything they might be, every contribution they might make, every influence they might have, for good or ill, is wiped out irretrievably.

So Jesus not only died, but he also sacrificed his earthly future — everything that might have been. Willingly. Just when his life was beginning. For you and me. This is a part of the great mystery of our faith that we so often don't consider. But we should.
