
#### THANK YOU

### Eight Things I Learned in 2023

It's that time! Let me tell you some things I learned or thought about in a fresh way in 2023.

- 1. I realized something last year that I wish I'd thought about a long time ago. Pastor Carol articulated this thought one Sunday as she was preparing us for worship, and it has resonated profoundly with me. It's the idea that the worship service has many purposes: praying in the midst of other seekers, glorifying God, affirming the Body of Christ, hearing the words of Scripture, supporting and being supported by a community of believers in our joys and sorrows, being in the presence of the holy... I could go on, but one benefit of worshipping together I hadn't considered before that Sunday. Worship is a respite for our troubles. When we gather together as a congregation, God gives each of us permission to drop, for a little while, whatever burdens we have been carrying around with us. We can lay aside our sorrows, disappointments, responsibilities, confusions, doubts, fears, grudges, angers, problems all those kinds of things that assail us or afflict us or just weigh us down as we enter the doors of the church, and just lose ourselves in the act of giving glory to our God. Then, when the service is over, if we still feel like we need them, we can pick up our troubles again as we leave.
- 2. It occurred to me last year that if there was ever a dream job for me, it would surely be thinking up names to give to new prescription drugs as they are brought to market. Just give me a couple of hundred thousand dollars a year, a bag full of Scrabble tiles, and a blindfold, and I know I could come up with the next Skyrizi or Biktarvi or Keytruda or Algarvyx or Otezla or Caplyta or Xyzal or Kesimpta or Entyvio. Oh, and to prove I really can do it, I made up one of the drugs in that list. Yep, they're all names of real drugs except for one, and that one came right out of my Big Bag o' Scrabble Tiles! Did you notice the fake? No? See, I'd be a natural!




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- 3. I really appreciate that this year Camp Chapel has stepped up our efforts to make visitors feel welcome among us. We've been a welcoming congregation forever, but some of the details are refreshingly different. For one thing, Pastor Carol has been referring to folks we haven't met yet as guests rather than visitors. I like that. Sure, calling them visitors is better than calling them strangers, but the word guest has a little extra warmth to it, don't you think? A visitor is somebody who drops by; a guest is someone we invite inside. I also like the fact that we not only speak of them as our guests, but we treat them as our guests too, particularly in that Pastor Carol tells them that we don't expect them to contribute to the offering when the plates are passed around. That's inviting. That feels like how a first century Christian congregation would behave.
- 4. I'm putting on my grumpy old man hat. There are certain clichés that I can't stand. One that bothered me particularly last year is the one in which somebody tells you something relatively mundane that happened to them and then adds, "...and the rest is history." For instance, "Hi. I'm Chad and this is my lovely wife, Tiffany. In 2007, we met on a blind date, fell in love, and, well, the rest is history." My my, Chad and Tiff, aren't we full of ourselves today! Listen here: in 49 B.C. Julius Caesar led his legions across the Rubicon River and into Italy in violation of Roman law, and the rest is history. In fact, it's one of the most important events in the rise of Western Civilization. In 1776, fifty-six delegates to the Continental Congress met in Philadelphia and voted to declare independence from Great Britain. The rest is history. In fact, it's the foundational event in all of United States history. But, Chad and Tiff, as much as we love you both (whoever you are), unless you, Tiffany, leave Chad to pursue a career in politics and eventually become the first woman elected president, and then you, Chad, assassinate her to get revenge for her rejection of your love, the rest may be a cute story you can bore your grandkids with, but whatever else "the rest" might be, it is definitely not "history."

All of those would be great candidates, but the ones I want removed are the insurance ads. I'm done with Flo and Jamie. I enjoyed the gecko for a long time, but not anymore. Get rid of them all! There's one ad for Liberty Mutual in which Doug, their spokesperson, thinks Liberty Mutual is about to drop a piano on his head. Yes, Liberty! Please! Do it!
- 7. Speaking of sports gambling, wagering on sports is now lawful in most parts of our country, and professional gamblers have taken advantage of legalization to become big businesses. They pay obscene amounts of cash to partner with just about all the amateur and professional sports organizations. Genius Sports has a ten-year contract with the NCAA, FanDuel is the official sports betting partner of Major League Baseball, and the NFL has not one, not two, but three betting partners: Caesars, DraftKings, and FanDuel. What could possibly go wrong? I'm not against gambling in and of itself, but sports and gambling shouldn't be partners. We've already seen a flurry of minor issues involving athletes and coaches betting on sports. With so much money on the line (so to speak), what do you want to bet that a major game fixing scandal like the 1919 Chicago White Sox were involved in will be exposed within the next five years? Hmm, let me rephrase that. What are the odds…? Oops! Well, I think you know what I'm trying to say.
- 8. I'm sure that most of you reading this are aware that the long-anticipated schism that caused many congregations to consider leaving the United Methodist Church became a hard reality last year. My attitude toward those churches before I attended Annual Conference could have been expressed as, "Don't let the door hit you in the back as you go." I was not prepared for the feelings of grief that I experienced when I voted to allow 23 of them to disaffiliate themselves from the rest of us. I was blindsided. You could probably tell from how difficult it was for me to report to you about it. And we will have another vote when Conference reconvenes in May. I'm not looking forward to that.


