
ADULT BIBLE STUDIES RESUME

Adult Bible study classes will meet for the first time on Sunday, September 15th, and Monday, September 1st. Classes meet in the Fellowship Hall Sunday mornings at 9:30 am and Monday mornings at 11 am. Both classes have the same lessons. Most classes are facilitated by Sue Garrison. Classes for the three Sundays and Mondays in September will be different. The 3 Sunday classes will be taught by Frank Long, whom many of you know is a seminary student. The title of his study is "Understanding the Christian Experience in the First Century Roman Empire through the New Testament", and it will show the development of the early Christian community through analysis of a sample of New Testament texts. Frank shared these lessons for adults during Vacation Bible School and those attending found them quite meaningful.

The 3 Monday classes will be taught by Pastor Carol using the series "Three Simple Rules: A Wesleyan Way of Living". John Wesley's rules may be simple, but they're not necessarily easy.

The beauty of these 2 studies is they have no text, so no preparation on your part.



In October, both sessions will begin the brand-new study from Abingdon Press titled *Knowing Who We Are: The Wesleyan Way of Grace* by Laceye C. Warner. Classes begin on Sunday, October 6th and Monday, October 7th. Join us to better understand Wesleyan Christianity and who you are as a United Methodist. Sue Garrison will facilitate the classes. The cost of the book is \$14.

People say the best part of these classes is the people. Lively discussion is a major part of each session. And it is **FUN** as well as educational. Getting to know others and respecting their points of view is all part of growing in our faith.

CERTIFIED FOOD SERVICE MANAGERS NEEDED



In order to continue to hold public dinners at Camp Chapel, we need to have a few more people trained as Certified Food Service Managers (Level II).

Certified Food Service Managers are people trained in the safe handling of food. Baltimore County regulations require that a certified food service manager be present at every dinner open to the public. Certified Food Service Managers do not have to do the actual cooking, but they must make sure that the food is cooked, handled, and stored safely.

CERTIFIED FOOD SERVICE MANAGER LEVEL II

Level II certification is required for any volunteer fire company or bona fide nonprofit fraternal, civic, veteran, **religious** or charitable organization that operates a high or medium priority food service facility three days or less per week.

TRAINING IS PROVIDED AT NO COST FOR INDIVIDUALS WHO DESIRE TO EARN THIS CERTIFICATION.



Bits and Pieces

Charades

Charades – it's been a fun party game for generations. I'm sure you know how it works, but just in case... Teams of players try to guess, within an agreed-upon length of time, the name of a song, movie, television show, book, play, etc. that one of their members acts out. The only hard and fast rule is that the person doing the acting is not allowed to speak. There are a few other elements to the game, like signals for the number of words or syllables, for a small word like "a" or "the", for a word that "sounds like" the word you're trying to act out, but those are the basics.

Every year, at our choir Christmas party, members of our Chancel and Bell Choirs and their guests end the evening with a raucous session of charades, and hilarity inevitably ensues. One memorable Christmas, one of our male singers was trying to act out the movie *Forrest Gump* without much success. If it had been me, I would have gone for Forrest first, but he chose to start by trying to act like the young Forrest Gump running while wearing leg braces. That got him nowhere. Next, he tried to get us to guess Gump by giving the signal for "sounds like", which is made by tugging on your ear. I would have gone for "sounds like 'jump'", but he tried for "sounds like 'rump'". The results were HYSTERICAL! He continued to perform the stiff-legged run of the boy wearing braces, but now he was pointing to and slapping his backside. He looked as if he were miming some kind of frenzied, wacky horse race, and the guesses went so far off the mark that there was little hope of getting them back anywhere near the correct answer. Soon, both teams were laughing so hard that it took several minutes for someone to notice that time had run out a long while ago. His performance was so memorable that during every Christmas charade game somebody is bound to bring it up and we'll all have another good laugh over it. But as with many funny moments told long after the fact, I suppose you had to be there.

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Last Thanksgiving, my family decided it might be fun to try charades after the turkey dinner. Everybody was encouraged to take part, and my grandchildren were particularly eager. Playing charades with a six-year-old is a different kind of experience. My grandson Archie was really into it, but not exactly clear on the concept. At first, he only wanted to do song titles. His idea of acting out a song title was to mouth the lyrics of the song silently while playing air guitar. Nobody had any idea what he was going for. Eventually, with a little coaching from his Pop-Pop (yep, that's me!), he started to get the hang of it. Eventually he thought he'd stretch himself a bit and his final attempt was a movie title. *Titanic*. Unfortunately, he has never seen the movie Titanic, except for one scene, and nobody knows where or how he viewed it. The scene he's watched is the one in which the great ship is already sinking fast. The 350-foot aft end of the vessel has risen up out of the water almost vertically. Everybody is screaming and climbing over one another and the main characters, Jack and Rose, are desperately struggling to get to the stern. They make it, and cling desperately to the rail with several other passengers. There's this one poor guy who loses his grip on the rail and falls backward from the stern, and the camera follows him all the way down until he crashes into the sea. So that's what he mimed, the poor guy falling backward into the ocean by flailing his arms while walking backwards, over and over. Nobody had a clue. People were guessing all sorts of things. Was he waving at someone running away from him? Was he being blown backward by a hurricane? Only Archie knew.

The history of divine revelation is a lot like a game of charades.

God rarely speaks to us directly to tell us what to do or what to avoid or what to believe or where we're going right or where we're going wrong. Oh, sure, we have a few stories in the Old

Testament. God spoke to Adam and Eve. God told Noah to build an ark. God commanded Abraham to leave Ur of the Chaldees and found a new nation. Moses communed with God several times, two of those, most famously, being God's appearance as a burning bush when God told Moses to lead the Hebrews out of Egypt and later, on Mount Sinai, when God gave Moses the tablets of stone on which were inscribed the Ten Commandments. There were a few others, but the point is, out of millions and millions and millions of humans who lived and died on this planet from the beginning of time until Jesus was born, only a lucky handful of them ever got to hear God tell them exactly what God wanted them to know.

As Christians, we all believe that Jesus was himself the embodiment of revelation. Those few who were privileged to meet and learn from Jesus when he preached and taught experienced revelation directly from the source. But even us, living two millennia after Jesus died and was lifted up from the grave, can read in the books of the New Testament the words he spoke.

There are many people, even some theologians, who have believed that revelation is over and done with. For them, revelation ended with the final word of the book of the Bible that has that name. For them, here and now, the best we can do is to study what is revealed in the writings of Scripture. For them, revelation is literally a thing of the past.

That is not what I think. I believe that revelation has continued and is still an important part of the human experience. Revelation is not just ongoing; it is a frequent and common part of our lives. Humans have, from our emergence as thinking creatures, always and forever striven to understand who we are and why we exist. We have pondered these questions, and in pondering them, we have encountered God. Before the story of Adam and Eve was first told, before Noah and Abraham and Moses, we were groping to know who God is and how we meet God. Each of us continues to encounter God and continues to wrestle with the question of how we relate to God, and we pursue the answers to these questions, most of us without ever hearing God's voice.

For most of us, God communicates much more subtly than God did with those Old Testament folks. Some of us find God in nature. Some of us encounter God in dreams. Some of us perceive God in history. Others see God in the actions of our fellow human beings.

But here is the problem, and Paul explains it perfectly in his first letter to the Corinthians, "For now we see in a mirror dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I have been fully known." In other words, given all that we can know about the words of Jesus and all that we can know of the thigs that God told Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Moses, and others and all that we deduce from nature, history, dreams, and the acts of other people, we still don't know enough. All we end up with are clues, and those clues, more often than not are pretty ambiguous. As I wrote earlier, revelation is like a divine game of charades. The clues God gives us are, like the flailing arms of a six-ear-old kid or the frenetic hopping and slapping of a singer at a party, open to many different, plausible interpretations. That is why a Christian, a Buddhist, and an atheist can, and do, examine the same evidence of revelation and still each comes away with a different answer. Or *Forrest Gump*. Or *Titanic*.

Part Six: Construction of the Current Sanctuary

Speakers address the congregation at the laying of the cornerstone

Sixty after the years ago, groundbreaking for the new Sanctuary in May of 1964, the congregation started seeing their hard work and dreams begin to take shape with the construction of the new building. The architect for the Colonial Structure was J. Prentiss Browne, Inc. and J. Clifton Kidd and Sons was the contractor, having been the lowest of five bidders. The building plans had been approved by the congregation at the approximate \$175,000.00 cost including furnishings. The plans included the main sanctuary with an auditorium and stage in the basement. additional wing was added to house the pastor's study and church office on the main floor and the choir room upstairs. Completion of the structure was expected to be by Easter of 1965.

On All Saints Day, November 1, 1964, the congregation participated in the laying of the cornerstone. By then the building was nearing external Participating in the completion. ceremony were Rev. Luther Starnes, pastor; Dr. E. Cranston Riggin, executive secretary of Missions and Church Extension of the Baltimore Conference of the United Methodist Church; Dr. Edward H. Porter, superintendent of the Baltimore East District; Dr. Clarence Fossett, former superintendent; district former

pastors of the church; Ormsby S. Moore, chairman of the building committee and J. Clifton Kidd, contractor. A time capsule was placed in the cornerstone with various church items and local events. Included was the birth that day of William Kidd Akehurst, son of William E. and Lois K. Akehurst, grandson of Carville G. and Doris M. Akehurst and grandson of J. Clifton

and Helen Kidd. At the 200th Anniversary in 2007 a second time capsule was buried in the ground at the base of the cornerstone.

Over the next few months there was the task of furnishing and beautifying the interior of the church. A committee of women from the church led by Mrs. Lois K. Akehurst and Mrs. Gladys Moore along with Rev. Starnes visited various colonial style churches in the Baltimore area for decorating ideas.

Also, a campaign led by William E. Akehurst and H. Gordon Hackman was held for memorial gift donations. Church members and friends outside the church donated items in memory or in honor of family members or to the glory of God.

Some of these donations included the baptismal font, the two clergy chairs, communion rails, the lectern, pulpit, a Bible and Bible stand, hymnals, the eternal hanging candle and the cornerstone. The list was endless. A dedication of the memorial gifts was held in the Sanctuary on Sunday, October 10, 1965.

The Sanctuary was completed in the spring of 1965. Landscaping around the church was donated by Carville G. Akehurst in memory of his wife Doris M. Akehurst.

The first service held in the church was the funeral of Mr. William Moore, a trustee and member of the building committee on May 14, 1965.

On Sunday, May 23, 1965, the Service of Consecration of the new Sanctury was held at the 11 am service. Those participating in the service included Dr. E. Cranston Riggin, Dr. Edward H. Porter and Rev. Starnes. The consecration sermon was given by Bishop John Wesley Lord. At 7:30 that evening there was a program of sacred music followed by a reception.

A service of Dedication of the Church and the Burning of the Mortgage was held at the 11 am service on Sunday, October 30, 1985. Joseph H. Yeakel, resident bishop of the Washington Area of the United Methodist Church gave the sermon. A luncheon followed the service and that evening there was a fellowship service held in the church.




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Throughout the years many changes have been made to the sanctuary including painting, drapes, a new organ, sound system and new windows. The basement was converted into classrooms, a conference room, and a library. The history committee is in the process of moving the history room from the tower behind the balcony to a room in the basement. Every Sunday at 11 am, we observe the traditional worship service with music from the choir and handbell choir. Ten plus years ago the contemporary service was added at 9:30 am. Concerts by the choirs and guest performers are held in the sanctuary. The only time services were not held was during the COVID pandemic, but we continued to worship via Zoom.


Today the church stands here at the corner of Joppa Road and Honeygo Blvd. as a beacon to the community of God's work.



Scam Alert: Fake Virus Threats

From time to time, the Acorn will present tips to help keep you, your devices, and the information they contain safe from online predators.

Malware is the technical term for a computer program that was written to do you harm by stealing your identity, stealing your money, or just disrupting your life. A *fake virus threat*, also called a *fake scan*, is a ruse used by hackers to try to fool you into loading malware onto your computer. The way it often works is like this: you are on the Internet, shopping or maybe googling something, when suddenly a pop-up window appears warning you that your device has been infected with a virus. The warning will typically direct you to do one of three things:

- 1. Click on a link to download a program to remove the virus. Do not do it!
- 2. Go to a website to purchase antivirus software. <u>Do not do that either!</u> The website could be fake and the "antivirus software" could contain malware.
- 3. Call a phone number to speak with an expert or a consultant. <u>Do not do it!</u> If this is a fake alert, a smooth-talking scammer will eventually get around to trying to obtain usernames and passwords or financial information.

Here are some signs that a virus alert is fake:

- Does the alert contain a request for payment? Legitimate companies don't ask for payment information until you decide to purchase their software and many offer free versions of their product.
- Is there a sense of urgency in the alert? Do you get the feeling that the alert is trying to scare you into doing something before you have a chance to think it over or consult with someone more knowledgeable than you?
- Does the text of the alert contain poor design, grammar, and spelling? Legitimate companies ensure that their communications look professional and use proper English.

What should I do if I think I have gotten a fake virus alert?

- 1. Close the pop-up window and exit your browser.
- 2. Consider downloading antivirus software from a legitimate company (see below) if you haven't already, and run a scan of your computer.
- 3. If all else fails, perform a factory reset.

Protect yourself before something like this happens!

- Avoid unsecure sites.
- Don't click on suspicious links or attachments.
- Use an ad blocker.
- Enable automatic software updates.
- Download and use antivirus software.
