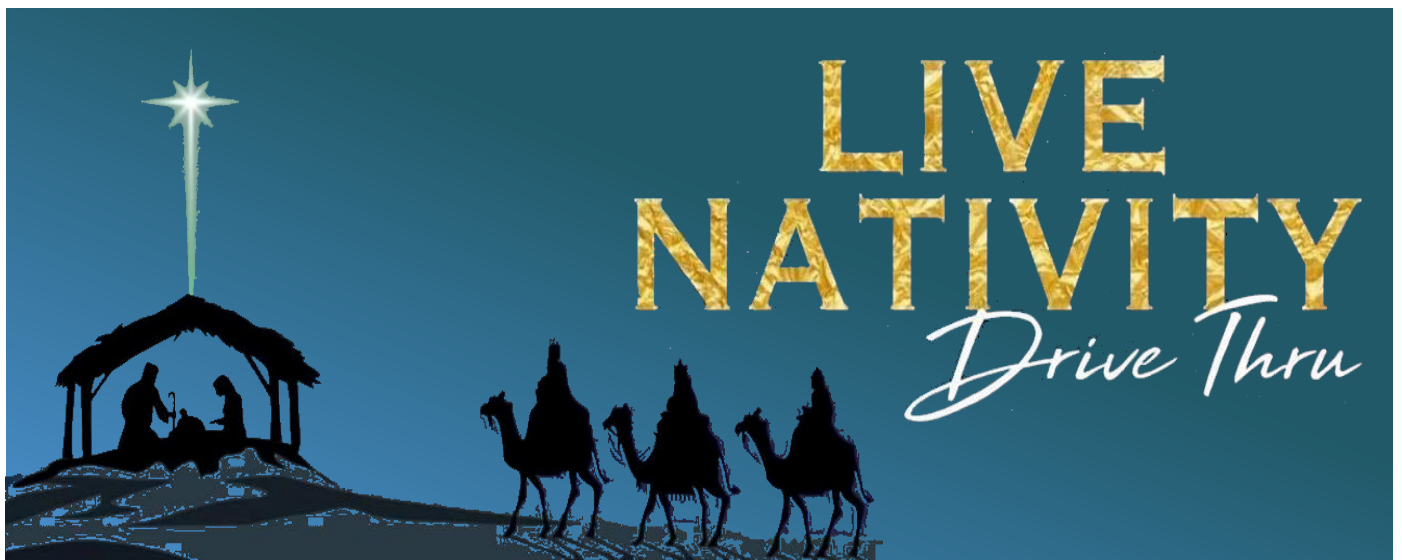
RECOGNITION TREE

Turnaround time will take about 2-3 weeks from the time the company receives the orders. Each engraved leaf will replace a blank leaf so that the tree will always look complete.

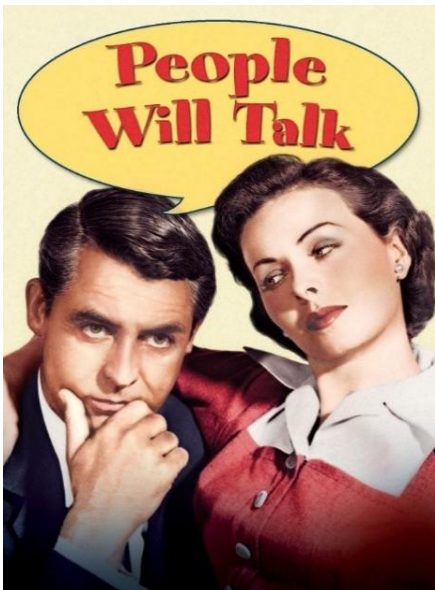

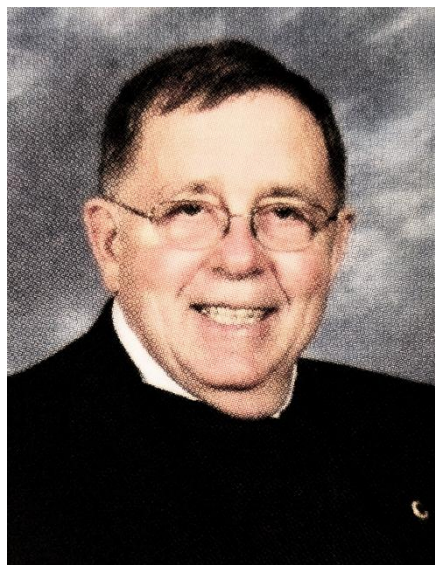

From the Church Historian

Church History: Our Pastors, 1984 - 2005

As we continue to focus on the pastors that were assigned to Camp Chapel, we begin with Rev. Paul Grant. Paul served here from 1984 to 1989. He grew up in Baltimore and as a young man attended Mt. Vernon United Methodist Church in Hampden where one of our former pastors, the Rev. John Lovejoy (1951-1953) was pastor.

Paul served in the military and at one time he and his wife Sally were stationed in Germany. While there, Sally started her collection of Hummel figurines.

They were the parents of three children, Doug, Cindy and Drew. The family spent many happy days at their home in Ocean Pines, in Ocean City, Maryland.

He loved to travel and went on several bus trips sponsored by the church including one that he organized to Branson, Missouri.

Previous churches that he served included: Fork United Methodist, Waugh United Methodist and Dublin United Methodist.

While at Camp Chapel he helped to organize the Boy Scout troop. One thing that he did not like was the local recreation councils scheduling sports activities on Sunday mornings.

He is known for special props that he used when giving his children's sermons which sometimes included live animals. While here, Sally was a member of the handbell choir.

The last church he served before retiring was Grace United Methodist Church in Aberdeen, Maryland. After retirement Sally and he made Camp Chapel their home church and he continued to serve the church as assistant pastor with Rev. Roberta Scoville, Rev. Joe Conte and Rev. Richard Brown-Whale.

Rev. Richard Simpson was assigned to Camp Chapel in 1989 and only served one year until 1990. He and his wife Carolyn were the last family to live in the parsonage before it was torn down to make room for the existing parking area.

From 1990 to 1996, Rev. L. Katherine Moore was assigned by the Conference to serve Camp Chapel. She was born in Baltimore and grew up attending Arnolia United Methodist Church. She received her Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1975 from Goucher College and her Master of Divinity Degree from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. in

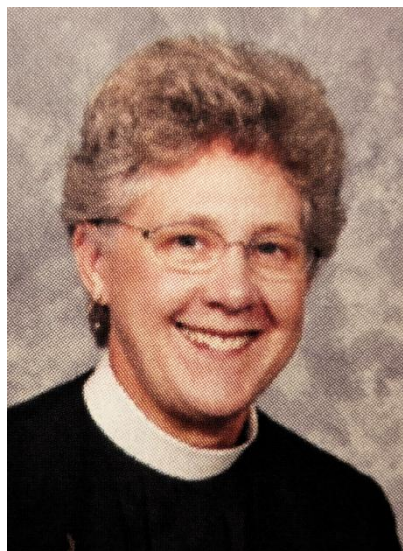
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1980. She served as a student pastor at the Pipe Creek United Church in Carroll County from 1977 to 1980 and from 1980 to 1990 was assigned to Abingdon United Methodist Church in Harford County.

In 1994 she requested a move by the Conference to a new church and left Camp Chapel in June 1996.

The Rev. Don Llewellyn was assigned to serve as interim pastor until a new pastor was assigned.



Rev. Dr. Roberta Scoville

Rev. Dr. Roberta Scoville was assigned by the Conference and served here from 1996 to 2005. She was born in Bradford, Pennsylvania. She received a Bachelor of Science Degree with a major in biology from William Jewell College in 1968. From 1968 to 1972 she taught at Martin Luther King Junior High in Pennsylvania. She continued to teach at various public and alternative schools from 1972 to 1978.

In 1993 she received her Doctor of Ministry from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. She was pastor at Cranberry United Methodist Church from 1983 to 1986. From 1986 to 1990 she was associate pastor at Grace United Methodist Church in Baltimore and from 1990 to 1996 she served Dublin United Methodist Church. She came to Camp Chapel in 1996. In

addition to serving our church, some of her responsibilities with the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference included serving on the Commission for Higher Education and Campus Ministry, the District Committee on Ministry and was a member of the Board of Ordained Ministry. In 1996, she was appointed by Bishop Felton May to serve as the first Dean of the Order of Elders.

She and her husband, Ralph, live in Havre de Grace and are the parents of two children: a daughter, Brooks, and a son, Benjamin.

Both Roberta and Paul Grant were present and participated in the church historical celebration that was held in 2007.

The next issue of the Acorn will conclude the history of the pastors with those that served from 2005 to the present.

The Lord's Prayer: ...Who Art in Heaven

I have long contended that most Christians don't say the Lord's Prayer properly. We tend to say it in short bursts, like we've all just finished the hundred-yard dash and are gasping for breath. Our Father (breathe), who art in heaven (breathe), hallowed be thy name (breathe). Thy kingdom come (breathe). Thy will be done (breathe) on earth (breathe) as it is in heaven (breathe)... you get the idea. For me, saying the Lord's Prayer like that destroys all its grace, poetry, and, most importantly, its meaning. It becomes not a prayer, but more a long incantation.

From time to time over the next few months, I'd like to break down the prayer that Jesus taught us – pull it apart and see what layers of meaning we can discern.

We say this prayer pretty much just as it appears in the New Testament Gospel of Matthew, the King James Version (KJV), with a few minor adjustments. A more succinct version can be found in the Gospel of Luke.

Last time, we pulled the beginning apart: “Our father...” This time, let's look at the phrase right after that: “...who art in heaven.”

Now, at first glance, “who art in heaven” seems a bit unnecessary. After all, shouldn't we assume that God is in heaven? We Christians believe that our God is everywhere, but let's face it, heaven is still the main headquarters, the home office, the base of operations, right? Heaven is God Central Station for Christians, Jews, and Muslims.

The reason Jesus included “who art in heaven” in his prayer has to do with why he gave us the Lord's Prayer in the first place. The disciples asked him to teach them how they should pray, and these are the words he offered them. Jesus taught them, and us, a prayer that has several purposes. In it we praise God. In it we ask God for help. In it, we make God a few promises. And “who art in heaven” belongs to that part of the prayer in which we profess to God some of our beliefs.

We believe in God. We believe that our relationship to God is like that of a devoted and beloved child to a strong, loving father. We explored those beliefs earlier. Here, we affirm that we believe in heaven.

So, what is this heaven of which we speak? We talk about heaven all the time, and when we do, it sounds as if it's a physical location – a place – piece of real estate. There are stories about heaven, movies about heaven, cartoons about heaven, jokes about heaven, songs and hymns about heaven. We have grown up with iconic ideas and images that go with heaven. Heaven is somewhat vaguely “up there.” According to Led Zeppelin (and 11 years earlier, Neil Sedaka, and a couple thousand years earlier than that, the Old Testament book of Genesis), there's a stairway that takes us to heaven. There are pearly gates that form heaven's entrance. Saint Peter stands guard duty at those gates. He stands behind a podium and according to some, he

and Tex Ritter, you can listen to giants of rhythm & blues, rock ‘n’ roll, and country-western music jam for eternity. When you get there, all your dead friends and relatives will gather at the gates to welcome you, and some say your dogs, cats, and other beloved pets will be waiting too.

As Christians, we believe that we will exist in our physical bodies – but our bodies as we never enjoyed them while we were alive. All physical imperfections will have been made perfect. No more aches and pains, amputated limbs restored, the ravages of time reversed. Sickness and disability will be unknown. We will be our ideal selves. And we will live in that place forever, glorifying God.

How much of all that do you believe? Me, I’m quite skeptical of most of those ideas and images.

What does Jesus tell us about heaven in the Lord’s prayer?

In a word, nothing. Jesus says that God is in heaven and that’s it. If you want to know about heaven, don’t look to the Lord’s prayer!

But Jesus gave us the Lord’s prayer in a context, and the Gospel of Matthew is packed with that context. According to Matthew, Jesus never spoke directly about heaven. He never described streets or gates or music or entrance exams or the dress code or how big it is or where it lies or anything like that. When Jesus teaches his disciples about heaven, he speaks pretty much exclusively in similes. “Heaven is like...” is how Jesus explains heaven to them and to us. So, heaven is like a mustard seed. Heaven is like a treasure hidden in a field. Heaven is like yeast. Heaven is like a merchant looking for pearls. Heaven is like a farmer sowing seeds. Heaven is like a net cast into the sea. And on and on and on.



I can't help but wonder how the disciples reacted to Jesus's teachings about heaven. The similes Jesus came up with, while they deal in mundane images, are amazingly abstract. Jesus chose images that must have been familiar to all his listeners, yet I have a hard time imagining what it must have been like to be a disciple, a person who until not so long ago may have been a fisherman or a tax collector, listening to the master talk about heaven being like yeast that a woman mixes into about sixty pounds of flour until she worked it all through the dough. I have trouble wrapping my head around that, but after he gave them that lesson, and several other heaven-similes later, Jesus challenged his followers. "Did you understand all that?" he asked them, and they all answered him, "Yes."

From all of this, I take the lesson that heaven is less a place and more a state of being.

There is one more point to make regarding why Jesus chose to mention heaven in his prayer, and it's all about the idea that heaven is a state of being. One of the beliefs that Jesus's prayer affirms in the words, "who art in heaven" is that the life that the disciples and we live while we are present upon the earth is just one state of being. Jesus is assuring us all that this life isn't all there is. We have a different state of being to occupy once this one is finished. Our physical existence will surely come to an end, but there's more!

The Lord's prayer has comforted millions upon millions of people in the two thousand years since Jesus taught it to us. I'm sure many, if not most, of the people who have believed in Christ through the years have prayed it often. Lots of Christians pray it at least once a day, maybe before they climb into bed to sleep. This prayer has brought peace and comfort to countless people in times of trouble, fear, sickness, loneliness, despair, and even at the point of death, because in praying it, we speak directly to God, we acknowledge that we have a warm and loving relationship with God, and we are assured that we will see God in heaven when our lives are over. And that's just in the first six words!

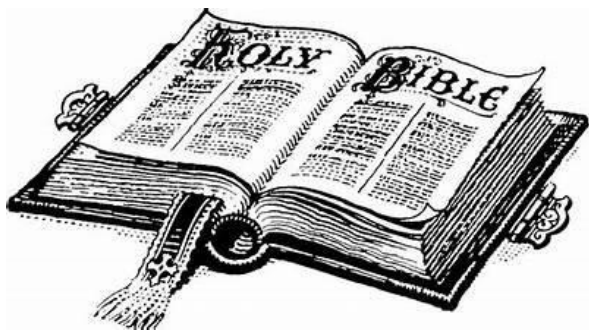
