A Message from Pastor Carol




Everyone knows about Halloween with its candy, costumes, and carved pumpkins. Not everyone knows about All Saints. On All Saints Day (November 1) or All Saints Sunday (the first Sunday in November), the living Christian saints gather to remember with joy and thanksgiving the saints who have gone on to glory. In keeping with the Apostle's Creed, we are celebrating the communion of saints as we remember those who have died.

John Wesley loved the festival of All Saints. He even wrote in his journal on November 1, 1767, "I always find this a comfortable day." Remembering those we love and their lasting impact on our lives does bring comfort. On All Saints, Christians reconnect with the history of our faith. We remember the saints of Scripture and of Christian history. We sense the great cloud of witnesses surrounding us as found in Hebrews. We remember those who shaped our spiritual lives through word and deed especially those who died within the past year. We participate in the communion of saints as confessed in the Apostles' Creed. We remember that this world is not our home, but that Jesus prepares an eternal place for us.

CAMP CHAPEL'S GARDEN VEGETABLES SERVED AT BOULEVARD CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Camp Chapel's vegetable garden, tended by Tammy and Don Stipek, had another bumper crop year with the goal of growing and sharing fresh produce with the community in the Essex area at two free community summer meals per week at Boulevard Christian Church. Our garden output was another great success and by September 29, we provided 3 gallon bags of lettuce, 22 yellow squash, 22 zucchinis, 25 peppers, 8 eggplants, 31 cucumbers, 2 dozen tomatoes, 3 dozen cherry tomatoes, 4 containers of sweet/sour cucumbers, 15 loaves of zucchini bread, and 2 containers of apple salad.

Big thanks to Tammy and Don for leaning into their call to tend creation with love, producing nutritious food to build and strengthen community.

- Student poverty is increasing in Baltimore County. According to a 2024 Johns Hopkins University study, one in three Baltimore County families is food insecure.
- Statistics for the 2023-2024 Baltimore County school year show 81,000 students qualify for FARMS (Free/Reduced Price Meals).
- Three local community schools have large numbers of FARMS students (Joppa View 76%, Honeygo 44%, Chapel Hill 34%).

Racial tensions escalate during a brutal summer heat wave in an African American neighborhood in Bedford-Stuyvesant and the focal point is Sal's Pizzaria.








From the Church Historian

Church History: Our Pastors, 2005 to the Present

This newsletter will continue to document the pastors that have been assigned to Camp Chapel from 2005 to the present.

Reverend Joe Conte served as Pastor from 2005 to 2007. He was born and raised in the Bronx,

New York. In 1971, he left New York for college in Baltimore, graduating from Johns Hopkins University in 1975 with a degree in electrical engineering. After graduation, he worked as an Electrician.


He married his wife, Jenny, in Baltimore in 1979 and resided in the Baltimore area until 1985 when they moved to Washington County, Maryland. They have three sons, Joe, Jason, and Jeremy. He became active in the local United Methodist Church in Keedysville, Maryland when he answered the call to ministry. His first pastoral assignment was in Bakerton, West Virginia at Bethel United Methodist Church in 1994. Then in 1999 he was appointed to Middletown United Methodist Church.

In 2002 he received his Master of Divinity degree from Wesley Theological Seminary. When he was assigned to Camp Chapel, he was completing his studies toward a Doctor of Ministry degree at Wesley Theological Seminary and

graduated in 2007.

Following Rev. Conte in 2007 was Rev. Richard Brown-Whale. He was not a new name to the people of Camp Chapel. We sponsored him and his wife, Kimberly, during their mission assignment in Grenada. They were engaged in Mission Work with four different United Methodist Annual Conferences in Pennsylvania. They worked with a program called "A United Methodist Witness in Pennsylvania". This program was designed to enable Methodists in Pennsylvania to stand united in their witness on behalf of the poor, the homeless and the addicted.

He was assigned to Camp Chapel in 2008. While here he, along with members from the church, traveled to Africa where they helped to paint school buildings, churches, and in various other areas where their help was needed. At the same time, Camp Chapel joined with Essex United Methodist Church, where Kinberly was Pastor, to feed and help with

the homeless. Since leaving Camp Chapel and retiring in 2019, they have lived in Reisterstown and continue to serve people in need.



Our present pastor, Rev. Carol L. Pazdersky, was assigned to serve here in July 2019. As a teenager she knew that the ministry was her calling. She is a graduate of the University of Maryland and Lancaster Theological Previously, she served churches in Harford, Calvert and Baltimore Counties. Her last assignment was the sister churches of Idlewylde United Methodist Church and St. John's of Lutherville United Methodist. Soon after her arrival here, she was faced with the challenge of continuing church services and meetings via ZOOM during the COVID lockdown in 2020. More recently, she had to hold services in the Fellowship Hall due to an oil tank problem. continues to guide and serve the church with her love of being a minister and helping her congregation. We will

Rev. Carol L. Pazdersky continue to support her with our time, our talent and our devotion to the good of Camp Chapel and the Perry Hall Community.


Her husband, Dan, is known here for his beautiful wood creations that are a big hit at the annual Talent Auction.

One last pastor that I want to recognize is the Rev. Robert (Bob) Fringo. He filled in many times for our pastors and he and his wife made Camp Chapel their home church.

The oldest of twelve children, he was born in Brooklyn, New York in 1927. He attended Brooklyn College and later transferred to Western Maryland College (now McDaniel College) in Westminster, Maryland, where he earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1955. In 1957 he earned his Master of Divinity degree from Westminster Theological Seminary.

He married Helen Cox in 1950 in New York.

Upon settling in Baltimore, he began his ministry at Light Street United Methodist Church. He served several other churches in Baltimore including Exeter Memorial, the Fells Point East Baltimore Station, and Caroline Street UMC. From 1975 to 1983 he served Emory United Methodist Church and Mt. Zion United Methodist Church in Ellicott City, Maryland. In Halethorpe, Maryland he was pastor at

Halethorpe-Relay UMC. After retiring in 1996, he was visitation minister for Loch Raven United Methodist and Acting Minister at Idlewylde United Methodist Church and here at Camp Chapel.

He was active in various community organizations in the Fells Point and Canton neighborhoods where outreach programs were designed to provide for those in need. He was also involved in youth programs, including the Boy Scouts.

He passed away in 2019. A celebration of life took place here and he is buried in the church cemetery.


I hope that you have enjoyed learning about the pastors that have served Camp Chapel and have been keeping our church a beacon of light for the Perry Hall Community.

Creation Care: Fall Leaf Cycling

Did you know you can find good use for your fallen leaves by leaf cycling? Leaf cycling, or nutrient cycling, refers to the natural process by which nutrients in leaves and other organic matter are broken down and recycled within ecosystems. When leaves fall to the ground, they decompose, releasing essential nutrients like nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium into the soil. Plants take up these nutrients, supporting their growth and development. Leaf cycling plays a crucial role in maintaining the health and productivity of ecosystems by ensuring a continuous supply of nutrients for plant life. Leaf cycling, as simple as spreading shredded or chopped leaves as a layer of mulch over garden beds, helps retain soil moisture, suppress weed growth, and release nutrients into the soil. So, after all the leaf raking is done, consider leaf cycling as a way to dispose of them and nourish your plants at the same time.



Gardening Update

On Saturday October 11, a crew of dedicated gardeners and volunteers gathered to work the gardens at Camp Chapel. (In case you weren't aware, each garden plot has been adopted by a church member and helpers.) We plan to place a fun sign in the next few months to identify the wonderful people doing this work for God's creation but just know they are dedicated and hard-working folks who work behind the scenes to give us the joy of sharing herbs and vegetables in the community and enjoying many lovely flowers around our campus.

Our next big project is a seating area in the space near the side ramp. We hope to complete this change by spring and will keep you informed as it progresses. In the meantime, enjoy the beauty of the fall landscape and see if you can find a hidden wonder on one plant: a chrysalis. I loved seeing it there and thank Ali for finding it. Is it a praying mantis, a butterfly, or a moth? We will follow and let you know!

Bits and Pieces

MWA-HA-HA-HA-HA-HA!

Between the time I snuggle between the sheets and when sleep claims me, I try to pray every night. I say I try, because it's a race between prayer and slumber, and slumber wins a lot.

My mother taught me to pray every night, and when I was very little, she and I would say my prayers together. Every night we would say the Lord's prayer and then we'd say the one that starts, "Now I lay me down to sleep." Those two are still my go-to prayers every night, then, I remember to the Lord people I know of who could use a prayer.

A friend of mine once confided to me that she rigorously maintained a long list of people for whom she prayed every night. She believed in her heart that if she missed mentioning one of them, even one night, something awful would befall that person. For her, praying for somebody in need had become not an act of loving and caring for someone else, but rather an obsession.

At the time we had this conversation, I had fallen out of the habit of saying prayers before going to sleep. It had been a long time – probably since high school. Instead, I prayed occasionally. By that I mean that whenever there was an occasion in which I felt a prayer was needed – for instance, someone I knew that was ill or troubled, or when I faced a difficult decision, or maybe if I passed an auto accident on the way to work – then I'd take a moment to say a prayer that fitted that occasion. I think I prefaced my remarks to her with that confession. I told her that prayer was a different experience for me than it was for her, but what I offered her was a reflection on a comment a nun in my grade school had made that had stuck in my memory. The good sister had accused one of my classmates of trying to be "holier than the Pope," and that accusation had set the nun off on a long lecture about the sin of presumption.

Presumption can take many forms, and one of them is placing too much faith in one's own abilities and not trusting God. I asked her if maybe she might be crediting herself with a bit of divine power without realizing it. By believing that a failure to include one of her people in her prayer routine would cause harm to that person, had she fallen into thinking that, in a strange sort of way, she, almost like a god, had the power to control their lives? I told her that being able to cause somebody harm just by not saying their name sounded like something an evil supervillain might have the power to do. I said, God isn't going to punish somebody you know if you forget them one time. God cares for that person more than you do!

I have no idea whether my words helped, but I have been thinking about her and about that conversation some lately. I find myself, from time to time, waking up in the morning and chastising myself, "Ah rats! I forgot to pray for John last night! He's already in surgery, I bet." I try to catch myself when that happens. I intentionally remind myself that I don't have that power. I don't think I'm in any danger of falling into the trap I talked to my friend about, but it never hurts to double-check.

On the other hand, it would be awfully nifty if I <u>did</u> have the power to control other people's lives, wouldn't it? I would be a pretty cool supervillain, I think!

Devotion for Home and at Camp Chapel Gatherings

Preparation suggestion: breathe in, breathe out, 3 times, each time a bit deeper and slower.

<u>Reflection</u> And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and God separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day," and the darkness God called "night." And there was evening, and there was morning—the first day. Genesis 3-5

In God's time, with God's wisdom and by God's compassion, God gave us light. Something so basic, so dependable, so repetitive that we may have forgotten it as God's first gift. Light means different things to different folks. What does light mean to you? What does the morning light offer you?

We sometimes think of light sustaining us, but what if each morning when we awake to God's light, we are called to generate ourselves anew, afresh. God gifts us a clean slate and full power each sunrise. What gift do we offer each day from the energy we derive from God's light and power?
