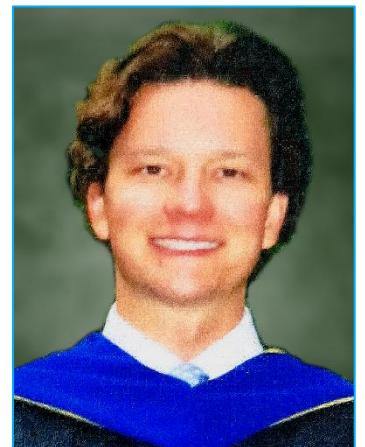


Zoie Elizabeth Gregory

How can I help the environment? I am only one person?

This seems to be on society's mind across the world as we study our changing climate and the needs of Mother Earth.

We are living during a changing time for weather events and drastic natural climate change and are witnessing the effects on humans, animals, insects, vegetation, and all God's creation. Here are a few small changes we can all consider:

Limit the size of your lawn. Grass is not the best use of the earth. Consider changing a grassy area into a rain garden. It is simple and attractive and can add interest to your view with the correct plant placement. Pollinators will hang out and amuse you with their beauty and resourcefulness! Maybe put out a bird bath! Plus, no chemicals are needed!

Convert a portion of your annual non-native plantings to native. Annuals are expensive and as their name implies die after one year. Perennials can be colorful, and because they return each year will get full and gorgeous in your gardens and porch pots. Native perennials need less maintenance, less watering, no fertilizer, and no pest control once established. Herbs are another good option.

Take a moment and follow up using this great book by Dr Ayana Johnson, *What If We Get It Right?* This is not a story of environmental gloom and doom, rather it explores the idea, what if we actually succeed in making a positive impact on the climate?

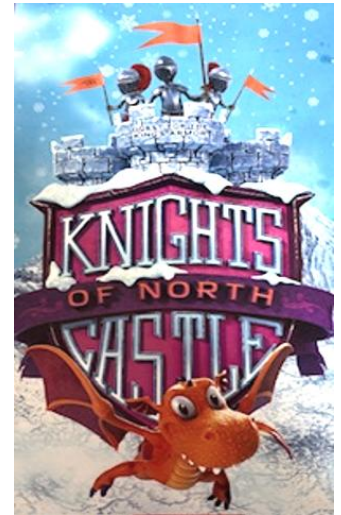

HELP WANTED

Summer Sunday School Teachers

This year, our Summer Sunday School will run from **June 7 through August 30**. To make this program possible, we are seeking adults to serve as teachers and assistant teachers so that we can fully uphold our **Safe Gatherings** requirements.



Safe Gatherings is our child-safety system that ensures a secure environment by requiring **two unrelated adults** in the classroom at all times. It

includes an online application, abuse-prevention training, and background checks. The certification is valid for two years, so some returning volunteers may need to recertify. All new volunteers will need to complete the training and background check process.

If we have enough volunteers, each adult will serve **one Sunday per month** – just three Sundays for the entire summer – and we can easily work around vacation schedules. We will have one classroom with two adults and approximately 6-10 children, using a simple format of a Bible story, a related video, and a craft or game.

I'm Off to Annual Conference!

As I write this, I am preparing to attend my 35th Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference. As was explained in an article in the May issue of the *Acorn*, the term “Annual Conference” has three meanings: it describes a geographical jurisdiction, it is the name of an organizational body, and it refers to a yearly meeting of that body. I’m going to the meeting.

I look forward to a whole list of things these three days. I will enjoy reconnecting with colleagues that I usually only get to see and talk with once a year at this conference. Some of these were classmates of mine back in the day when I attended classes to fulfill requirements for retaining my status as a Certified Lay Speaker. Some of these were the teachers of those classes. Some of these were students of mine from a year in which our then pastor, Roberta Scoville, and I co-taught a wonderful group of dedicated people who aspired to become Certified Lay Ministers. On the other hand, most of them are just people I got to know over lunch, dinner, or at various workshops. It’s such a pleasure to reconnect and to catch up!

I can’t wait to meet new people. It’s a big meeting, with hundreds of attendees from churches all over the Annual Conference (I’m talking geography this time), so most of the time, the people I’m listening with, discussing with, worshipping with, singing with (other than Pastor Carol, who will most likely be sitting right next to me) are usually complete strangers. When there’s room in the agenda for us to talk, I get to hear some amazing stories. And these folks become the people I’ll be looking for next year!

I anticipate some interesting discussions. I never fail to encounter someone who has an idea that I have never contemplated before. I have to stop and think a lot! And I believe that kind of encounter makes me continue to evolve as a Christian. Considering new ideas and new ways of restating old ideas and beliefs keeps me open and curious, and for me, that equals spiritual and intellectual growth. Sure, once in a while an idea I hear can be pretty far out there, but I almost always get the sense that the person I’m hearing it from has invested a lot of themselves into getting to that far out place, and even in my processing and ultimately disagreeing with an idea there is the fact that in considering it I also must invest something of myself in justifying my reasons for rejecting it, and thus I can’t help but grow. I hope that makes sense.

I will very much enjoy the worship services and the music. Worship at Annual Conference is unfailingly uplifting and inspiring. And the highlight for the past ten years has been the message of Bishop Easterling. Her powerful preaching is, for someone like me, who has the audacity to occupy the pulpit in Camp Chapel’s sanctuary from time to time, something to stand in awe of. For the past few years, the Annual Conference (I’m talking about the organization this time... and I guess about the gathering too) has posted video of the opening worship service on YouTube, and for the last two years I have sent some friends and relatives the link to that video so that they can see and hear for themselves not just her astounding erudition and dynamic oratorical gifts, but also the spirit in which she brings her message. I am sure that the bishop will amaze not just me, but all the attendees again this year.

Scam Alert: Employment Scams

More than a million people were laid off last year, and with so many unemployed workers seeking jobs, it should come as no surprise that criminals have found ways to take advantage of the situation. Here are some things to be on the alert for if you are seeking employment:

- Actual employment opportunities do not require you to pay anything up front for an interview or a position. Never pay a fee!
- Be wary of opportunities that guarantee big money and short hours for at-home work.
- If you are contacted by a recruiter, check with the company to make sure they are hiring and that the recruiter actually works for them.
- Look over your resume and make sure you aren't including details that a criminal could use.
