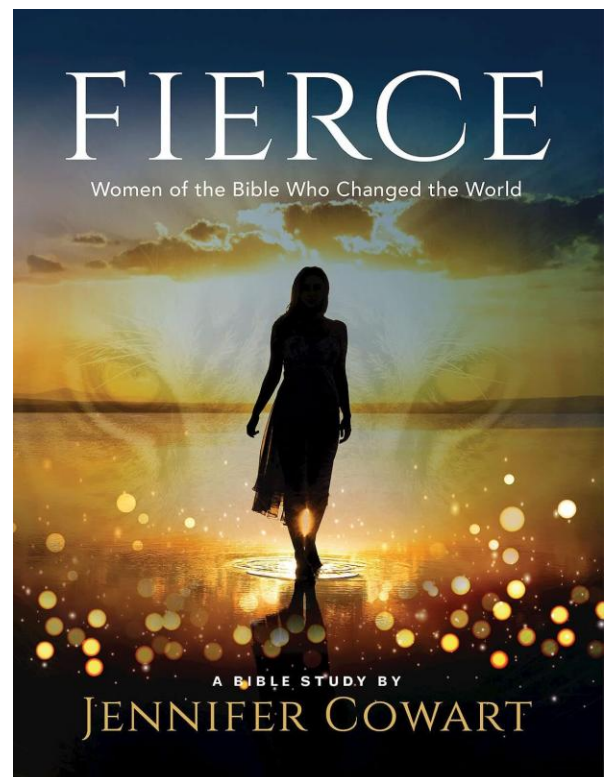
ADULT BIBLE STUDY

FILM SEMINAR ANNOUNCES ITS 18TH SEASON

The Camp Chapel Film Seminar is back for our 18th season. The theme this season is “Movies About People of a Certain Age.” We view interesting films, some classics and others less well known. Each session begins and ends with a discussion of the movie and how it illustrates some aspect of our Christian journey. We meet each month on a Saturday at 6 pm via Zoom. You can join us for a few movies or all of them, depending on your interests and your schedule.

Our film lineup for 2026-2027 (subject to change):

September 19, 2026 – *The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel* (Comedy-Drama, 2011) A group of British seniors move to a retirement home in India. Some of them adjust well to their new surroundings while others have a bit more difficulty.

October 17, 2026 – *Unforgiven* (Drama, 1992) William Munny is an aging widower in 1880 Wyoming. Now a failing farmer, he was once a notorious outlaw. Needing money for himself and his children, he reluctantly decides to take one more job as a bounty hunter.

November 21, 2026 – *On Golden Pond* (Drama, 1981) Golden Pond is the summer home of feisty Ethel and her husband Norman, a retired professor having trouble dealing with his advancing age. Norman has an uncomfortable relationship with his daughter Chelsea, but he and Ethel agree to care for Billy, the son of Chelsea’s latest boyfriend.

December 5, 2026 – *Grumpy Old Men* (Comedy, 1993) John and Max are next door neighbors, two old men who spend most of their time making each other miserable. When an attractive widow named Ariel moves into the house across the street, John and Max vie for her affections.

February 20, 2027 – *The Bucket List* (Comedy, 2007) Carter and Edward form an unlikely friendship while sharing a room in the hospital. Both diagnosed with terminal cancer, they decide to make a list of things they want to do before they die and begin to cross items off it.

March 20, 2027 – *Robin and Marian* (Romance, 1976) Robin Hood returns to England from the crusades and discovers that the Sheriff of Nottingham has orders to arrest Marian, his former love. He rescues her against her will.

April 17, 2027 – *The Intern* (Comedy-Drama, 2015) Ben is a retired executive who is so bored that he applies for a job as an intern at an e-commerce fashion company. He is assigned to the CEO, Jules, who is skeptical of him and ignores him. Can he win her over?

May 8, 2027 – *Remarkably Bright Creatures* (Drama, 2026) Tova is a lonely woman who works as a night janitor at an aquarium. She develops a friendship of sorts with Marcellus, an elderly octopus in one of the tanks. Marcellus narrates the film.

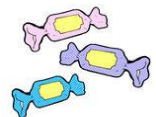

Church Organizations:

The Board of Trustees was originally the governing body of the church. The Methodist Discipline made the Trustees responsible for the church buildings and grounds, legal titling, income and how it was spent, building, rebuilding and any improvements made to any of the existing structures, the cemetery, and church grounds, fund raising, debts, and insurance and legal matters. Today the Board of Trustees is part of the Church Council and any improvements to any of the buildings, cemetery and church grounds must be presented with a written form to the trustees for approval.

Eventually, the church divided some of these previous responsibilities of the Trustees to the Official Board. The name was later changed to the Administrative Board which saw to the various activities of the church. Today it is called the Church Council.

In 1889, when Camp Chapel was a part of the Great Falls Circuit, the Epworth League was organized. This organization was founded for the youth and young adults in the church. The members of the group held meetings, helped with church activities, and attended District meetings and retreats at Mountain Lake Park and Emory Grove. Later, when Camp Chapel was part of the Chase Circuit, they became known as the Methodist Youth Fellowship (MYF). Meetings were held and projects were combined with Cowenton Methodist Church.

In March 1957, after Camp Chapel became an independent church, the MYF was divided into two groups, the Intermediates, 7th to 9th grades, and the Seniors, 10th grade and up. The groups met every Sunday for Bible study and organized and presented Easter sunrise services held in the old Fellowship Hall and the cemetery. After the service they provided breakfast. They gathered toys and clothes at Christmas, wrapped them, and delivered them to children in the hospital. They helped to serve at church suppers and would go on hayrides to Emory Grove in Glyndon, Maryland. Halloween parties and other theme related parties were held during the 1980's. Eventually the name was changed to the United Methodist Fellowship. Today the youth help with church activities selling food at the yard sales and various other community activities.

The women's group was originally the Ladies Aid Society of the church. In the beginning, they met in the homes of their members. They supported the church with suppers held in the old Fellowship Hall (now part of the parking lot). Later the group was renamed the W.S.C.S (Woman's Society of Christian Service) and was a group for all women. In 1957 when Rev. Henry Ernst was pastor, another group was organized called the Chapel Bells. This group was geared primarily for the younger housewife, their interests, problems, and needs. Their work was a supplement to, and not a replacement for, the work of the W.S.C.S. It was led by Priscilla Ernst, wife of the pastor. Eventually the W.S.C.S. became known as the United Methodist Women in 1982. They not only held church suppers, but also Holiday bazaars, participated in district meetings and volunteered at Montebello Hospital and Wesley Home. They also supported the Board of Child Care. Today we have the Circle of Sisters that continue to serve the church in various ways.



The men's organization in the church was the Methodist Men's Fellowship (MMF), and it was started in the mid-1950s. On January 14, 1957, the newly formed Men's Fellowship held their first charter night, featuring guest speaker, Harry Schuh, lay leader of the Baltimore Conference, and Hamilton Hooper, lay leader. They presented the charter to the church. Rev. Ernst accepted the charter and presented it to Stanley Davies, the president of the MMF, who accepted it on behalf of the Fellowship. Members then came forward and received their membership cards and signed their names to the charter.

Later the MMF became known as the United Methodist Men. They helped with church activities, held suppers and talent shows, and painted and made repairs needed in the Fellowship Hall and Church. They also participated in outreach activities in the community. Today, the Band of Brothers continue to serve and help in various outreach programs,

Since COVID, many meetings of church organizations have been held on Zoom. Camp Chapel is still a big part of the Perry Hall community, and we continue to serve God and the church.

Devotions for Home and Camp Chapel Gatherings

Romans 8: Enlightening our Spirits *(based on reflections by UMC Creation Cafe March 2026 webinar with Romans 8:26-27 reflections in the Spiritual Formation Bible)*

Tending a garden is like tending our spirit. As stewards of our church grounds, we can view our work as simply removing weeds and dry stalks or with the dual purpose of lifelong land stewardship embracing God's full life cycle from birth to death to life.

With the presence of the Holy Spirit, we may see things dramatically different: when the Spirit enlightens "the eyes of [our] heart (Eph 1:18), so we can understand the hope to which God calls us."

Take a moment with these thoughts:

- Gardens touch everything about our sacred life, our created life, our material life.
- To till and keep the garden is one of the very first things God requested of Adam and Eve.
- There is nothing that separates us from the creation, the cosmos that God created. Through God, we are interconnected like all the parts and seasons of a garden.

Take time to reflect on the big picture of God nurturing you, as you nurture creation:

- *What behaviors of a garden give a big picture of what a disciple should be?*
- *How might we cultivate new lifeways for the sake of a hope filled world?*

Listening with our heart leads us to "understand the hope to which God calls us".

The Lord's Prayer: "Thy Will Be Done on Earth as It Is in Heaven"

I have long argued that most Christians don't say the Lord's Prayer properly. We tend to say it in short bursts, like we're trying to teach it to a friend who is practicing their breathing technique in a pool. Our Father (submerge), who art in heaven (gasp and submerge), hallowed be thy name (gasp and submerge). Thy kingdom come (gasp and submerge again), thy will be done (and gasp and submerge) on earth (and gasp and submerge) as it is in heaven (and gasp and submerge)... you get the idea. For me, saying the Lord's Prayer like that destroys all its grace, poetry, and, most importantly, its meaning. It becomes not a prayer, but more a long incantation.

From time to time, I will be breaking down the prayer that Jesus taught us – pulling it apart and seeing what layers of meaning we can discern.

We say this prayer pretty much just as it appears in the New Testament Gospel of Matthew, the King James Version (KJV), with a few minor adjustments. A more succinct version can be found in the Gospel of Luke. The version we use most often – the one our mothers and fathers probably taught us – can be found in the United Methodist Hymnal at number 895.

We have already covered "Our father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come..." This time, let's look at the next bit: "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"

First, let's examine the clause, "thy will be done." This is a tough one. Who of us is so bold that we would claim to know God's will? Not me! There are certainly times when I'm pretty sure that it is clear to me. I'd never think that God wants me to break one of his ten commandments, for example. But sometimes I come to places in my life where I need to make an important choice, and the ramifications of that decision are obscure. I know that this is a significant crossroads, but all my options have pros and cons. It's like being on "Let's Make a Deal" and having to pick Door Number One, Door Number Two, or Door Number Three. What God wants for me, not to mention anybody else who may be affected by the path I choose, is just not making itself obvious. Has that ever happened to you? Do you pray for guidance? Sometimes that works, and God sends some sort of sign that leads us this way or that. But often God stays quiet. When you see something or feel something that you take to be a sign, do you ever wonder if it's coming from God, or is it from somewhere inside your own mind – your subconscious leading you where you, and not necessarily God, want you to go?

In these situations, we know we have to do something. we can't just stay in the spot we're in, paralyzed, waiting forever for God's will to reveal itself to us.

I think for most of us, we can only do what we think is best and pray that the path we have chosen is the one God wants for us and trust that God will have God's way, whatever we choose to do. Our trust in God to work God's will through us is one of the aspects of our faith in God.

At its core, the question of whether or not we are doing God's will grows out of our notion of what our own free will means.



Free will could be the second greatest gift that God has given us, second to sending us Jesus. As do most Christians, we believe that God allows us to make our way in God's world as independent beings with an agency that is all our own, not determined by some script that God has written for us.

There are those who do not accept the notion of free will. Some of these, who perhaps do not believe in a supreme being, attribute every decision we make to the interactions of chemicals and electrical impulses in our brains. For them, free will is just an illusion created by those same chemicals and moving electrons. There are also Christians who believe that our every move has been preordained by God, and that whatever choices we make as we go through the motions of our lives is as inevitable as the rising and setting of the sun. In their world view, the will of God is always coming to fruition, and whatever decisions we make have been set from before the moment of creation. Praying that the choices we make are in accordance with God's will is a waste of time, because God is pulling all the strings and we are God's marionettes. For them, God's will is already done on earth as it is in heaven.

We Methodists and many other denominations believe that we are not puppets, and the Lord's Prayer is our pledge to act as free humans and trust that what we do is God's will. The Lord's Prayer is our profession of both faith and hope.

Let's look at the second part of this phrase now: "on earth as it is in heaven." First of all, I believe that this applies to all the statements about Our Father that have come before, not just to "thy will be done." Hallowed be thy name on earth as it is in heaven. Thy kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven. Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. These three petitions all make sense to me.

In teaching us the Lord's Prayer, Jesus has taken it for granted that in heaven, God's name is sacred for all eternity, God's kingdom has been established for all eternity, and that in heaven, God's will has been accomplished for all eternity. Here on earth, that may or may not be the case, and that's why we pray this prayer. Earth is the battleground on which we, as Christians, are praying and striving at the same time to make the Lord's Prayer a reality in our lives.

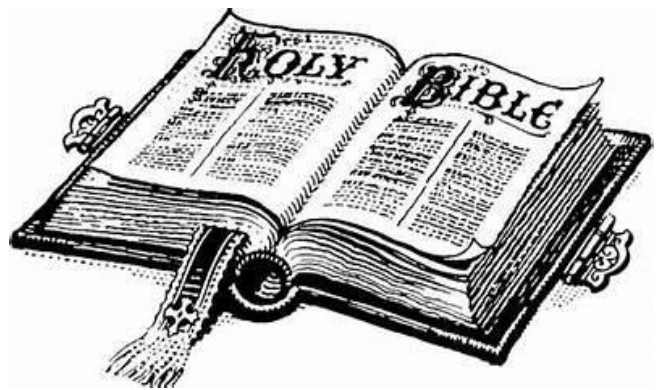
